

The Romance of

History



This peaceful temple in the mountains is said to have been established by Prince Shotoku over 1,300 years ago. The invaluable statue of the seated Bodhisattya Hayagriya enshrined here is nationally designated as an Important Cultural nationally designated as an important Cultural Property, and is said to have been made in the late years of the Heian era (794–1185). 4 Kehi Jingu Shrine Home to One of Japan's Three Largest Wooden Torii Gates

Located in the main part of Tsuruga, Kehi Jingu hrine was revered as the main protectorate shrine of the old Hokuriku-do region, and even today it possesses incredible dignity. Its vermillion-painted torii gate is one of the three largest wooden torii gates in Japan, and is nationally designated as an Important Cultural Property.


